SECTION B**TEXT D — A NEW AGE IN ACADEMICS****Communicative Purpose**

Description Factual – communicate to students through written guidelines

Register and Style

The register should be in the range of semi-formal to formal.

Language accuracy is not formally assessed here and should be considered only where mistakes obscure meaning.

Message

The aim is to write a set of guidelines for students on appropriate uses of technology in education. The student's feelings of positivism towards technology and the Internet should be clearly conveyed. The descriptors regarding copying from the text should be strictly adhered to. Verbatim copying of short sections of the text does NOT constitute "undue copying"; the copying of any section (whether it be long or short) without using it appropriately and incorporating it sensibly into the response would constitute undue copying. Students should be heavily penalized for writing guidelines for using technology without citing details from the source text.

The writer should include some of the following details from the text:

- many advantages to using technology in education, particularly Internet tools and resources
- students can research topics with library catalogues, public databases, search engines, and the WWW
- easy access to online collections
- students can e-mail the library and have someone find the books they need
- can do research from anywhere / a coffee shop
- e-mail and listserves support communication between teacher, students and peers
- can collaborate on research and projects with those in other countries electronically
- instructional materials such as syllabi, lecture notes, presentations, assignments, and announcements are shared online
- the variety of information available on websites is growing
- with video streaming, students can learn from events in real time
- students can easily cut and paste the sections they need into papers.

Criterion B:

To achieve level 5 (adequate understanding) at least five details should be included.
To achieve level 9 (very good understanding) at least eight details should be included.
