1. Roman epic

- (i) Lines 405-406 (*ad caelum ... palmas*). Explain how these lines suggest the pathos of Cassandra's situation so effectively. [3 marks]
- (ii) Translate lines 407-408 (*non tulit hanc ... agmen*). [3 marks]
- (iii) Explain line 412 (*Graiarum errore iubarum*). [2 marks]
- (iv) Scan lines 418-419 (*Eurus equis ... fundo*). [2 marks]

(b) Virgil *Aeneid* 2.619-633

- (i) Line 621 (*dixerat*). Who had spoken to whom, and for what purpose? [2 marks]
- (ii) Scan lines 624-625 (*tum vero ... Troia*). [2 marks]
- (iii) Lines 626-631 (*ac veluti ... ruinam*). Identify **three** features which make this an appropriate “epic simile”. [3 marks]
- (iv) Translate lines 632-633 (*descendo ... recedunt*). [3 marks]

2. Tacitus' presentation of imperial policy.

(a) Tacitus *Annals* 15.34-15.35

- (i) Line 1 (*Illic*). Where was Nero, and why? [2 marks]
- (ii) Lines 3-4 (*ergo ... celebrans*); what **two** things did Nero celebrate?
To what event was he responding? [3 marks]
- (iii) Translate lines 6-7 (*Vatinius inter ... scurrilibus*). [3 marks]
- (iv) Lines 9-10 (*eius minus ... cessabatur*). What evidence does Tacitus use to support this allegation? [2 marks]

(b) Tacitus *Annals* 15.65-15.66

- (i) Lines 1-2 (*quin et verba ... canebat*). What had Flavus hoped to achieve?
Explain the humour of this passage. [3 marks]
- (ii) Line 4 (*eundem concium et inquisitorem*). To what fact does this phrase allude? [2 marks]
- (iii) Lines 5-6 (*neminem ... ipsum*). Show how these words are deliberately ambiguous. [2 marks]
- (iv) Translate lines 6-8 (*non vox ... manifestus*). [3 marks]

3. Cicero's political speeches

(a) Cicero *pro Caelio* 13

voluptatibus inquinatior, quis in laboribus patientior? quis in rapacitate avarior,

habebat, servire temporibus suorum omnium pecunia, gratia, labore corporis,

iucunde, cum senibus graviter, cum iuventute comiter, cum facinerosis audaciter,

- (i) Lines 1-4 (*quis clarioribus ... effusior*). What single point is Cicero making about Catiline here? How does his use of rhetoric reinforce it? [3 marks]
- (ii) Translate lines 4-5 (*illa vero ... obsequio*). [3 marks]
- (iii) How does line 7 (*etiam*) draw attention to a new direction in Cicero's rhetorical argument? [2 marks]
- (iv) What is the logical relationship between lines 7-8 (*versare suam ... flectere*) and lines 8-10 (*cum tristibus ... luxuriose vivere*)? What picture of Catiline's character does it draw? [2 marks]

(b) Cicero *pro Caelio* 36

eum putato tecum loqui: “quid tumultuaris, soror? quid insanis? quid clamorem exorsa verbis parvam rem magnam facis? vicinum adulescentulum aspexisti; candor huius te et proceritas, vultus oculique pepulerunt; saepius videre voluisti; fuisti non numquam in isdem hortis; vis nobilis mulier illum filium familias 5 patre parco ac tenaci habere tuis copiis devinctum; non potes; calcitrat, respuit, repellit non putat tua dona esse tanti; confer te alio. habes hortos ad Tiberim ac diligenter eo loco paratos quo omnis iuventus natandi causa venit; hinc licet condiciones cotidie legas; cur huic, qui te spernit, molesta es?”

- (i) Who is *eum* (line 1)? What attitude to the case does Cicero suggest he would have? [2 marks]
- (ii) What attitude to Caelius is attributed to Clodia in this passage, and what attitude is recommended? [2 marks]
- (iii) Translate lines 6-7 (*habes hortos ... venit*). [3 marks]
- (iv) Select **one** example of sustained rhetorical skill in this passage and show how it achieves its effects. [3 marks]

4. Love poetry

(a) Horace *Odes* 1.22

(ii) Line 9 (*namque*). What kind of illustration of the preceding stanzas does the reader expect to be introduced by this word? What are we actually given? [2 marks]

(iii) Lines 17-24 (*pone ... pone ... dulce ... dulce*). Show how the repetitions underline Horace's points. [3 marks]

(iv) Lines 23-24 (*dulce ... loquentem*). What especially attracts Horace to Lalage? [2 marks]

(b) Ovid *Amores* 1.12.1-16

- (ii) Give **two** reasons, chosen from this passage, why Ovid's plan in 1.11 had failed. [2 marks]
- (iii) Translate lines 13-14 (*proiectae ... onus*). [3 marks]
- (iv) Scan lines 15-16 (*illum etiam ... manus*). [2 marks]

5. Roman satire

(a) Juvenal *Satires* 5.146-160

- (ii) Give **two** examples of Virro's conduct criticized by Juvenal in this passage. [2 marks]
- (iii) Translate lines 156-158 (*forsitan ... gula*). [3 marks]
- (iv) Scan lines 159-160 (*si nescis ... molari*). [2 marks]

(b) Juvenal *Satires* 11.151-164

- (ii) Scan lines 156-157 (*nec pupillares ... praebuit alas*). [2 marks]
- (iii) Translate lines 159-160 (*hic tibi ... lusit*). [3 marks]
- (iv) Lines 162-164 (*forsitan ... puellae*). What does this passage suggest about other dinner parties and Juvenal's attitude to them? [2 marks]

 7. "Tacitus is more of a propagandist than a historian." Discuss. You should include material from at least **two** books of the *Annals*.
 8. Choose specific examples from both the *pro Caelio* and the *pro Milone* to assess Cicero's strengths and weaknesses as a rhetorician.
 9. Discuss how likely it is that the poems you have read by any **three** of Catullus, Horace, Propertius and Ovid are autobiographical.
 10. Assess Juvenal and Petronius as observers of Roman life.
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
