SECTION A

*Answer the questions on **three** of the passages. The three passages should be selected from **two** prescribed topics only.*

1. Roman epic

(a) Virgil *Aen* 2.141-59

Quod te per superos et conscientia numina veri,
per si qua est quae restet adhuc mortalibus usquam
intemerata fides, oro, miserere laborum
tantorum, miserere animi non digna ferentis.'

- (i) *quod te per...ferentis* (lines 141-4). Who is speaking these words? What is he trying to achieve? [2 marks]
- (ii) Translate *quisquis es...roganti* (lines 148-9). [3 marks]
- (iii) *quo molem...machina belli* (lines 150-1). Who is speaking these lines? What is striking about their style? What is its effect in context? [3 marks]
- (iv) Scan lines 158-9 (*fas odisse...legibus ullis*). [2 marks]

(b) Virgil *Aeneid* 2.220-34

- (i) Identify *ille* (line 220). What does the word *vittas* (line 221) remind us about him? [2 marks]
- (ii) Translate *qualis...securim* (lines 223-4). [3 marks]
- (iii) *et scelus...hastam* (lines 229-31). What did the people believe had happened here? Were they right? [2 marks]
- (iv) Scan lines 233-4 (*numina...urbis*). What is unusual about one of the lines? [3 marks]

2. Tacitus' presentation of imperial policy

(a) Tacitus *Annals* 15.41

Domuum et insularum et templorum quae amissa sunt numerum inire haud promptum fuerit: sed vetustissima religione, quod Servius Tullius Lunae et magna ara fanumque quae praesenti Herculi Arcas Evander sacraverat, aedesque Statoris Iovis vota Romulo Numaeque regia et delubrum Vestae cum Penatibus populi Romani exusta; iam opes tot victoriis quaesitae et Graecarum artium 5 decora, exim monumenta ingeniorum antiqua et incorrupta, ut quamvis in tanta resurgentis urbis pulchritudine multa seniores meminerint quae reparari nequibant. fuere qui adnotarent XIII Kal. Sextilis principium incendii huius ortum, et quo Senones captam urbem inflammaverint. alii eo usque cura progressi sunt ut totidem annos mensisque et dies inter utraque incendia numerent.

- (i) Translate *domuum...fuerit* (line 1). [3 marks]
- (ii) *sed vetustissima...exusta* (lines 1-4). Identify briefly any **three** proper names from this section. [3 marks]
- (iii) *iam opes tot...nequibant* (lines 4-6). What category of sacred things destroyed in the fire has been listed so far? To what different category does he turn now? [2 marks]
- (iv) *alii eo...numerent* (lines 7-8). What was the nature of the calculation described here (details not required)? How does Tacitus suggest his view of it? [2 marks]

(b) Tacitus Annals 15.60.2-4

Sequitur caedes Annaei Senecae, laetissima principi, non quia coniurationis manifestum compererat, sed ut ferro grassaretur, quando venenum non processerat. solus quippe Natalis et hactenus prompsit missum se ad aegrotum Senecam uti viseret conquerereturque cur Pisonem aditu arceret: melius fore si amicitiam familiari congressu exercuissent; et respondisse Senecam sermones mutuos et crebra conloquia neutri conducere; ceterum salutem suam incolumitate Pisonis inniti. haec ferre Gavius Silvanus tribunus praetoriae cohortis et an dicta Natalis suaque responsa nosceret percontari Senecam iubetur. is forte an prudens ad eum diem ex Campania remeaverat quartumque apud lapidem suburbanum rure substiterat. illo propinqua vespera tribunus venit et villam globis militum saepsit; tum ipsi cum Pompeia Paulina uxore et amicis duobus epulanti mandata imperatoris edidit.

- (i) Who was Annaeus Seneca (line 1)? Explain *non quia...processeret* (lines 1-2). [3 marks]
- (ii) *solus quippe...inniti* (lines 2-6). What is Natalis trying to prove here? What, very briefly, is his evidence? [2 marks]
- (iii) *haec ferre...iubetur* (lines 6-7). What was Gavius Silvanus asked to do? [2 marks]
- (iv) Translate *tum ipsi...edidit* (lines 9-10). [3 marks]

3. Cicero's political speeches

(a) Cicero *pro Caelio* 8

Illud tamen te esse admonitum volo, primum ut qualis es talem te omnes esse existiment, ut quantum a rerum turpitudine abes tantum te a verborum libertate seiungas; deinde ut ea in alterum ne dicas quae, cum tibi falso responsa sint, erubescas. Quis est enim cui via ista non pateat, quis est qui huic aetati atque isti dignitati non possit quam velit petulanter, etiam si sine ulla suspicione,
5 at non sine argumento male dicere? Sed istarum partium culpa est eorum qui te agere voluerunt; laus pudoris tui, quod ea te invitum dicere videbamus, ingeni, quod ornate politeque dixisti.

- (i) To whom is Cicero speaking here? How does he treat him and why? [3 marks]
- (ii) *deinde...erubescas* (line 2-3). According to Cicero here, what should his adversary not do? Why should he not do it? [2 marks]
- (iii) *quis est enim...male dicere* (lines 3-5). What is it that is open to all? [2 marks]
- (iv) Translate *laus pudoris...dixisti* (line 6). [3 marks]

(b) Cicero *pro Caelio* 20

Nec tamen illud genus alterum nocturnorum testium perhorresco. Est enim dictum ab illis fore qui dicerent uxores suas a cena redeuntis attractatas esse a Caelio. Graves erunt homines qui hoc iurati dicere audebunt, cum sit eis confitendum numquam se ne congressu quidem et constituto coepisse de tantis iniuriis experiri. Sed totum genus oppugnationis huius, iudices, et iam prospicitis animis 5 et, cum inferetur, propulsare debebitis.

- (i) *nocturnorum testium* (line 1). What was the allegation made by these witnesses? [2 marks]
- (ii) *graves erunt...experiri* (lines 2-4). For what reason does Cicero believe that the allegations will not be brought to trial? [2 marks]
- (iii) *graves erunt...audebunt* (lines 2-3). Show how the literal meaning of this sentence is different from what Cicero means. [3 marks]
- (iv) Translate *sed totum...debebitis* (lines 4-5). [3 marks]

4. Love Poetry

(a) Catullus 51

- (i) Which Greek lyric poet is Catullus imitating here? In what way is the context of the Greek poem different from that of the Latin one? [2 marks]
- (ii) *lingua sed...lumina nocte* (lines 9-12). Give **three** physical effects described by Catullus here. [3 marks]
- (iii) Translate *otium, Catulle...urbes* (lines 13-16). [3 marks]
- (iv) Give **one** reason for accepting or rejecting the last stanza (*otium, Catulle...urbes*) as part of the poem. [2 marks]

(b) Horace *Odes* 2.12

- (i) Explain in context any **two** of the following: *durum* (line 2), *purpureum* (line 3), *saevos* (line 5) *nimium mero* (line 5), *domitosque* (line 6). [2 marks]
- (ii) According to this ode, what sort of poetry is Horace refusing to write and what kind is he keen to write? [2 marks]
- (iii) Who was Maecenas (line 11)? Why is he mentioned here? What is meant by *pedestribus* (line 9)? [3 marks]
- (iv) Translate *me dulces...amoribus* (lines 13-16). [3 marks]

5. Roman satire

(a) Juvenal Sat 4.1-15

Ecce iterum Crispinus, et est mihi saepe vocandus
 ad partes, monstrum nulla virtute redemptum
 a vitiis aegrae solaque libidine fortis
 deliciae; viduas tantum spernatur adulter.

- (i) *viduas...adulter* (line 4). Explain what this means. Why does Crispinus have this policy? [2 marks]
- (ii) Scan lines 5-6 (*quid refert...in umbra*). [2 marks]
- (iii) Briefly tell the story that Juvenal gives us to illustrate his view that *nemo malus felix* (line 8). [3 marks]
- (iv) Translate *sed nunc...morum* (lines 11-12). [3 marks]

(b) Juvenal Satire 5.114-24

Anseris ante ipsum magni iecur, anseribus par
115 altilis et flavi dignus ferro Meleagri
spumat aper: post hunc tradentur tubera, si ver
tunc erit et facient optata tonitrua cenas
maiores. “Tibi habe frumentum,” Alledius inquit,
“o Libye: disiunge boves, dum tubera mittas.”
120 Structorem interea, ne qua indignatio desit,
saltantem spectes et chironomunta volanti
cultello, donec peragat dictata magistri
omnia. Nec minimo sane discrimine refert,

- (ii) What does Alledius mean by saying *tibi habe...mittas* (lines 118-9)? [3 marks]
- (iii) Scan lines 121-2 (*saltantem...magistri*). [2 marks]
- (iv) Translate *nec minimo...secetur* (lines 123-4). [3 marks]

6. In book 2 of the *Aeneid*, how does Virgil ensure that Aeneas is not condemned for fleeing from his city?
 7. ‘Disloyal to his friends.’ Is this a fair comment about Nero? Base your answer on incidents from **both** *Annals* 14 and *Annals* 15.
 8. What do we learn from the *pro Caelio* about the lives of the rich and influential in Cicero’s Rome?
 9. Choose any **two** of the poets Catullus, Horace and Ovid, and explain what you do and/or do not like about them.
 10. Drawing your examples from at least **three** of his *Satires*, discuss whether Juvenal saw himself as a social reformer or as a commentator only.
