1. Roman epic

(a) Virgil *Aeneid* 2.57-72

- (i) Give the name of the *iuvenis* (line 57) and explain what he is hoping to achieve in this passage. What is his eventual aim? [3 marks]
- (ii) Translate lines 67-68 (*namque ut ... circumspexit*). [3 marks]
- (iii) With what argument in lines 69-72 does the *iuvenis* attempt to find favour with his captors? [2 marks]
- (iv) Scan lines 71-72 (*cui neque ... poscunt*). [2 marks]

(b) Virgil *Aeneid* 2.281-295

 quae tantae tenuere morae? quibus Hector ab oris
 exspectate venis? ut te post multa tuorum

- (i) Who is the speaker of lines 281-286 (*‘o lux ... cerno’*)? In what circumstances is he making the speech? [2 marks]
- (ii) Who is the speaker of lines 289-295 (*heu fuge ... ponto*)? What does it reveal about him and why is he important for the plot of the *Aeneid*? [3 marks]
- (iii) Translate 291-292 (*sat patriae ... fuissent*). [3 marks]
- (iv) Scan lines 294-295 (*hos cape ... ponto*). [2 marks]

2. Tacitus' presentation of imperial policy.**(a) Tacitus *Annals* 15.47**

- (i) What is the next major topic in the narrative? How does Tacitus imply a relationship between these topics and the preceding passage? [2 marks]
- (ii) Explain what is meant by *sanguine inlustri semper Neroni expiatum* (line 2). [3 marks]
- (iii) Describe any **two** unnatural portents given in this passage. [2 marks]
- (iv) Line 5 (*secutaque haruspicum interpretatio*). Explain what this was. [3 marks]

(b) Tacitus *Annals* 15.53.1-2

- (ii) Translate lines 3-5 (*ordinem ... incautum*). [3 marks]
- (iii) Line 8 (*templo ... Ferentino*). Why does Tacitus include this detail? [2 marks]
- (iv) In what way was the conduct of Scaevinus different from that of the other conspirators? [2 marks]

3. Cicero's political speeches

How does he set about doing it? [2 marks]
- (ii) Line 1 (*ut ad me revertar*). Suggest why Cicero wanted to talk about
himself. [3 marks]
- (iii) Lines 3-6 (*nam quod obiectum est ... esse natum*). Explain the humour in
this point. [2 marks]
- (iv) Translate lines 6-7 (*sunt enim ista ... liberalis*). [3 marks]

- (ii) Line 3 (*argumentis agemus*). What is Cicero proposing to do here? How honest is his claim? [2 marks]
- (iii) Translate lines 7-9 (*vellem dictum ... fatetur*). [3 marks]
- (iv) Line 9 (*est enim rex*). Identify the *rex* and explain Cicero's point here. [2 marks]

4. Love poetry

- (i) Line 1 (*ne sit ... pudori*). What advice does Horace give to Xanthias here? What general argument does he use in lines 2-10 to justify it? [2 marks]
- (ii) Identify *Atrides* (line 7) and *virgine* (line 8) and briefly explain their story. [3 marks]
- (iii) Translate lines 17-20 (*crede non illam ... pudenda*). [3 marks]
- (iv) Lines 22-24 (*fuge suspicari ... lustrum*). How old is Horace? What does he suggest is the relevance of his age? [2 marks]

- (ii) Lines 6-7 (*solus in Libya ... leoni*) and lines 15-16 (*ut multo mihi ... medullis*). Show how these images bring out the difference between Septimius and Acme. [2 marks]
- (iii) Line 22 (*Syrias Brittaniyasque*). For what geographical reason does Catullus choose these two places? [2 marks]
- (iv) Translate lines 25-26 (*quis ullos ... auspicatiorem*). [3 marks]

5. Roman satire

- (iii) Translate lines 39-40 (*incidit ... Ancon*). [3 marks]
- (iv) Scan lines 43-44 (*solibus ... pingues*). [2 marks]

- (iv) Scan lines 141-142 (*sed tua nunc ... loquaci*). [2 marks]
